



It is recommended that works of art donated to Texas Wesleyan be professionally appraised by the owner.

When there is no appraisal provided and the gift's estimated value is less than \$5,000, the donation will be determined by the University as having a \$1 value on our records. It is up to the donor to determine a value if they want to use the donation as a charitable deduction for income tax purposes. If the value is \$5,000 or more the University asks the donor to provide a written appraisal by an independent, third party, qualified appraiser, which will then be used to value the gift, and an acknowledgement will be provided to the donor. When accepting visual art donations, the following will be taken into consideration to determine the best plan going forward – provenance, quality, size, condition, rarity, historical importance, authenticity, subject matter, display, and ability to store and secure.

Art accepted for donation may be placed in a University location (i.e. office, common areas, gallery, etc.) but this is not guaranteed. When not on display, all reasonable measures to secure the art in a safe and climate controlled storage location will be provided.
